THE HALIFAX EXPLOSION

9:30AM - 11:00AM - The Maritime Museum of the Atlantic
1675 Lower Water Street, Halifax

11:30AM - 12:00PM - St. Paul's Church
1749 Argyle Street, Halifax

12:30PM - 1:00PM - Mont-Blanc Anchor Site.
110 Spinnaker Drive, Halifax

9:30AM - 11:00AM
Maritime Museum of the Atlantic (See artifacts here at the same time you are learning about the Halifax Explosion)

1:30PM - 2:30PM - Fairview Lawn Cemetery
3720 Windsor Street, Halifax

3:00PM - 3:30PM
The Mount Olivet Cemetery (includes the grave of Vincent Coleman, heroic railway dispatcher who sent warning of the explosion.) Olivet Street, West End Halifax

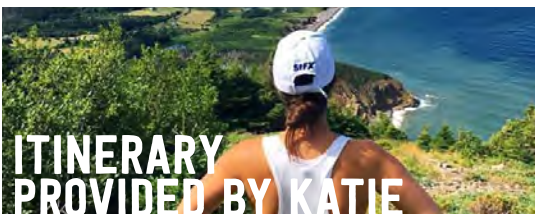
CHECK OUT THE THE OLDEST BUILDINGS IN HALIFAX

9:00AM - 10:00AM
Starting in Downtown Halifax, visit the **St. Paul's Church** - Built in 1750, this is the oldest structure in Halifax. Sitting in Grand Parade Square, this church is still in use, and you can enter for FREE. 1749 Argyle Street, Halifax

10:30AM - 11:30AM
Visit the **Little Dutch Church**, built in 1756, the Little Dutch is the second oldest building in Halifax. It's notable features are the surrounding burying grounds. 2393 Brunswick Street, Halifax

12:00PM - 12:30PM
If you have a car, drive out to the **Sambro Island Lighthouse**. Not only is this the 3rd oldest structure in Halifax, it's also the oldest lighthouse in North America. Sambro Island, Halifax

1:00PM - 2:00PM
On your way back towards Downtown Halifax, dine at the **Armview Restaurant & Lounge**, an old-school diner loved by all! 7156 Chebucto Road, Halifax

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THE HISTORY OF THE FIVE FISHERMEN RESTAURANT

A well-known seafood restaurant, The Five Fishermen Restaurant, has some unique history and hauntings. It's housed in a building that was originally constructed as a schoolhouse in 1817, then became a mortuary called John Snow & Co. Funeral Home. Most recently, it opened its doors in 1975 as the Five Fishermen.
